we join her in honoring your holy mem - o - ry, //

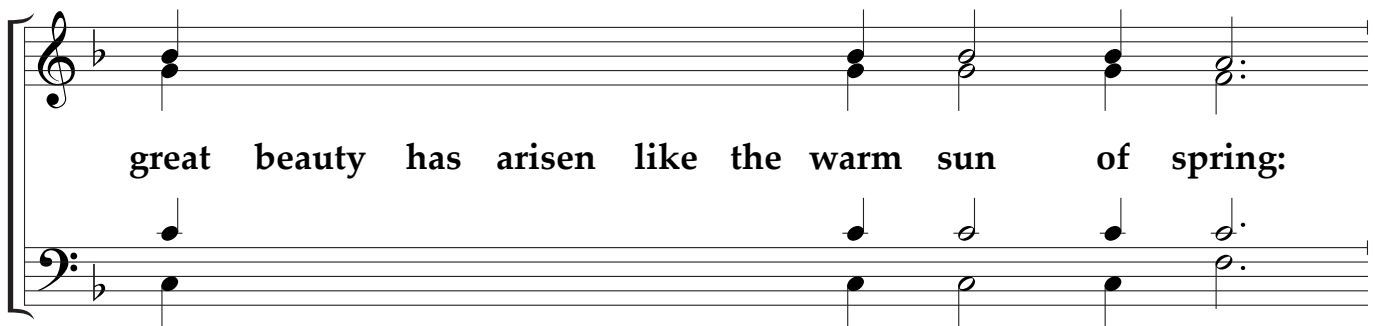
glorifying our God Who is won - drous in His Saints.

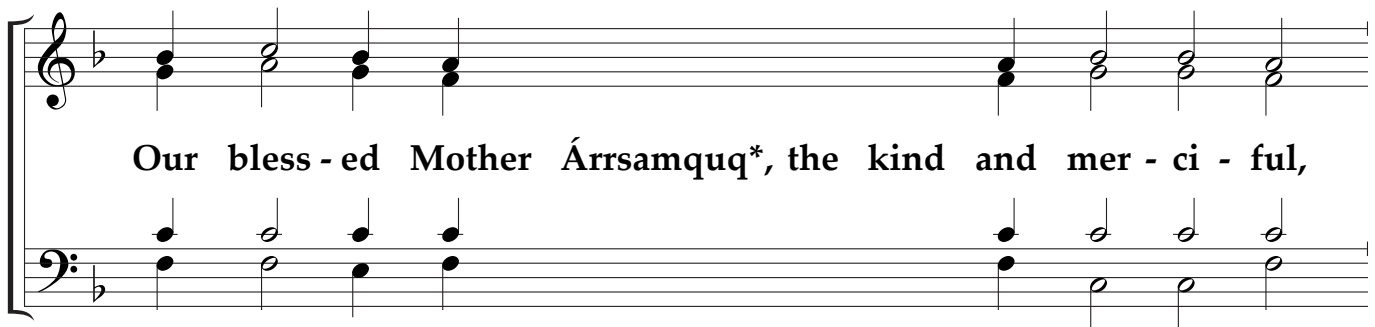

great beauty has arisen like the warm sun of spring:



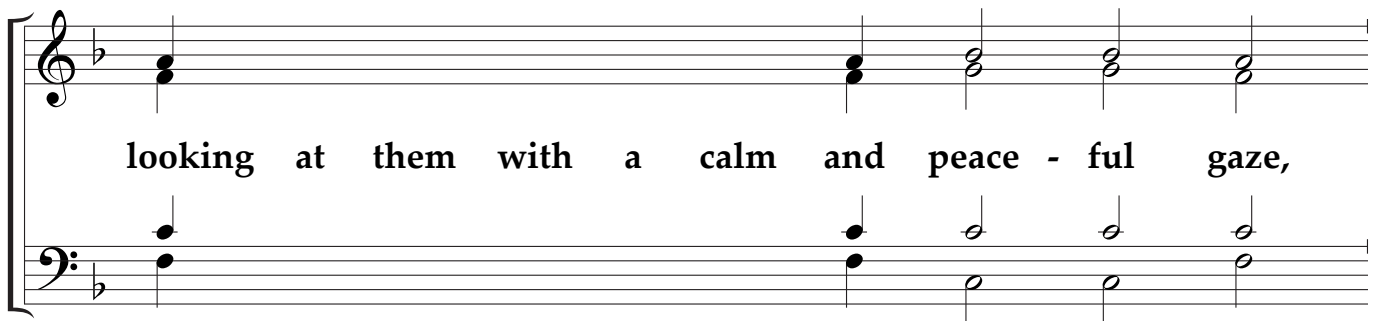
Our bless - ed Mother Árrsamquq*, the kind and mer - ci - ful,
