Divine Liturgy, Kontakion, Tone 8

When you fulfilled the dispensation for our sake, and united earth to heaven, you ascended in Glory, O Christ our God, not being parted from those who love You, but remaining with them and crying: I am with you and no one will be against you!

FAMILY ACTIVITIES

- ♦ Come to Church as a family to celebrate the Feast Day. If you cannot come on the Feast itself, come on the eve of the Feast.
- As a family, read the Scriptural references and explain to your children the events of the Feast Day and the meaning behind the events.
- ♦ Discuss the Ascension icon with your children. If you have this icon in your home, display it in your family's place of prayer for veneration. You may wish to decorate it with flowers.
- ♦ This Feast has an "afterfeast" period of 7 days. Use the Troparion and Kontakion hymns as prayers before and/or after meals, and as a part of your children's evening prayers during this period.
- ♦ Use a helium balloon to describe the word "ascension."

THE ASCENSION OF OUR LORD CELEBRATED ON THE 40TH DAY AFTER PASCHA

On the 40th day after His passover, Jesus ascended into heaven to be glorified on the right hand of God (Acts 1:9-11; Mk 16:19; Lk 24:51). The Ascension of Christ is His final physical departure from this world after the resurrection. It is the formal completion of His mission in this world as the Messianic Savior. It is His glorious return to the Father Who had sent Him into the world to accomplish the work that He had given Him to do...

In the Church the believers in Christ celebrate [this feast] with the conviction that it is for them and for all men that Christ's departure from this world has taken place. The Lord leaves in order to be glorified with God the Father and to glorify us with Himself. He goes in order to "prepare a place" for, and to take us also into the blessedness of God's presence. He goes to open the way for all flesh into the "heavenly sanctuary...the Holy Place not made by hands" (Heb 8-10). He goes in order to send the Holy Spirit, Who proceeds from the Father, to bear witness to Him and His gospel in the world, making Him powerfully present in the lives of His disciples (Worship, The Orthodox Faith, Vol. 2, by Fr. Thomas Hopko).
