TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 2015

His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon celebrated a prayer service at 9:04 AM to open the meeting at the Immaculate Conception Seminary.

A. Agenda: Introduction

The meeting was then called to order. Fr. Eric Tosi requested approval of changes to the agenda in that the Archives Advisory Committee presentation and the Strategic Plan Post-Conciliar Committee report would follow the Metropolitan's report.

A.1. MOTION MIKHALEVSKY/VITKO – To approve the agenda for this meeting as amended. CARRIED.

B. Roll Call/Approval of Minutes of Previous Meeting (attached)

Fr. Tosi then conducted the roll call, introduced guests present for this session, and announced others who would be present at various points during this meeting (see participants list). He requested approval of Alexis Liberovsky as recording secretary for the meeting.

B.1. MOTION GALLICK/VITKO – To approve Alexis Liberovsky as recording secretary. CARRIED.

He presented the draft minutes of the previous meeting of the Metropolitan Council on September 23-25, 2014 for approval. Fr. Joseph Gallick suggested a revision as follows on page 8 in section S.1: "He appealed for qualified priests to consider serving as chaplains." Archpriest John Jillions requested a revision on page 4 in section F as follows: "Archpriest John Jillions, Chancellor, presented his attached written report...". He further requested that his report be included with the publicly posted reports from this meeting as indicated in the minutes. It was also suggested that the concluding sentence (now incomplete) of Section F.1 on page 8 be revised as follows: "Questions and discussion ensued."

B.2. MOTION LANIER/DICK -- To accept the previous meeting minutes of September 23-25, 2014 as amended. CARRIED.

E. Metropolitan's Report (attached)

Metropolitan Tikhon welcomed everyone and presented his attached written report. He noted the presence at this meeting of the new members of the Lesser Synod: Archbishop Melchisedek and Bishop Mark. Bishop Michael is unable to attend due to speaking engagement in California. He highlighted the importance of the upcoming 18th All-American Council and acknowledged with gratitude the productive work in preparation for the Council of the Preconciliar Commission, the Local Organizing Committee, the Statute Revision Task Force and Melanie Ringa, who is preparing a resolution on church funding for presentation to the Council. In reflecting on the theme of the All-American Council, he suggested a focus in three areas for expanding the Apostolic work of the Church: 1) Missions and Evangelism, 2) Clergy Health and 3) the strengthening of our institutions, particularly Monasteries and Seminaries. He then noted the importance of the archives in preserving the church's legacy as an inspiration and vehicle in our mission moving forward. He invited the Archives Advisory Committee to present its report.

G.2. Archives Advisory Committee (attached)

To update the written report of the Committee submitted to the Metropolitan Council in advance of its meeting, Mr. Alexis Troubetzkoy, Chairman of the Committee, addressed the Council to summarize the accomplishments of the Committee's meeting during the preceding two days. This was supplemented with a PowerPoint presentation. He concluded with an appeal for guidance from the Holy Synod and the Metropolitan Council in finding the proper solution for the future housing of the OCA Archives. Committee members in attendance answered questions from the Council and discussion ensued.

Following a short recess at 10:56 AM, the session resumed at 11:09 AM.

E. Metropolitan's Report (continued)

As he began discussion of the work of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America and OCA participation in it, Metropolitan Tikhon indicated the importance of our archives and the historical legacy documented within them are for the work of unity among all Orthodox in America. He noted the *Preliminary Response of the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America to the Proposals for Canonical Restructuring* issued last fall and invited input from the Metropolitan Council to a draft text for a fuller response, which he will distribute. His Beatitude then reported on his recent productive visits to the Patriarchates of Constantinople and Moscow as well as his concelebration and meeting with Patriarch John of Antioch in the US. Extensive discussion on all of these issues ensued.

Following a recess for lunch at 12:31 PM, the afternoon session was called to order at 1:33 PM.

Metropolitan Tikhon concluded his report by asking for special prayers for the Archdiocese of Canada, Archbishop Seraphim, and the victims in his case. He also noted that with recent elections and ordinations of bishops, all diocesan sees of the OCA except the South have been filled. Finally, he thanked the Metropolitan Council, the Church officers and the staff for their hard work and offered a reflection to guide us into Great Lent from the text of the penitential troparia sung beginning on the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee.

L. Strategic Plan Post-Conciliar Committee (attached)

Fr. John Vitko highlighted his attached report with a PowerPoint presentation. He noted that this would be the final report from the Committee as its mandate to implement the Strategic Plan adopted at the 16th All-American Council is ending and the Committee will be disbanded. He expressed satisfaction that almost all the goals envisioned at the 16th All-American Council have been fulfilled and that many activities, such as continuing education for clergy, related to the Strategic plan are now part of normal church life. He then answered questions from meeting participants and discussion ensued.

F. Chancellor's Report (attached)

Archpriest John Jillions, Chancellor, summarized his attached written report. He thanked His Beatitude and the other officers for a productive environment at the chancery. He focused on pastoral issues and announced that Fr. Nathan Preston has begun to revive the work of the Department of Pastoral Life and Ministry. He also highlighted his participation in the Committee for Pastoral Practice of the Assembly of Bishops and noted the wide divergence of pastoral practices among the jurisdictions in the Assembly.

F.1. ORSMA

In the absence of Cindy Heise, Fr. Jillions highlighted her confidential report from the Office of Review of Sexual Misconduct Allegations (ORSMA), which included case statistics, coordinator activities, ORSMA statistics analysis and goals for 2015. Questions and discussion ensued. It was noted that background checks for parish council members and other parish leadership positions have been recommended but not mandated for many years.

F.2. SMPAC (attached)

Dr. Albert S. Rossi presented the attached written report from the Sexual Misconduct Policy Advisory Committee (SMPAC).

F.2.A MOTION LANIER/KUCHTA – To move into executive session. CARRIED.

Confidential matters pertaining to sexual misconduct and related issues were discussed in executive session.

F.2.B. MOTION MITCHELL/GALLICK – To move out of executive session. CARRIED.

Further discussion ensued concerning background checks and other matters.

Following a short recess at 3:27 PM, the session resumed at 3:44 PM.

G. Secretary's report (attached)

Archpriest Eric Tosi, OCA Secretary, summarized his attached written report. He also presented a proposal on a printed Orthodox Journal as a lead to the All-American Council.

G.2. IT report (attached)

Fr. Tosi introduced Ryan Platte, Technical Manager of the OCA website, who presented his attached report on management of the OCA website and other computer issues at the OCA chancery.

H. 18th All-American Council (attached)

Fr. Tosi delivered his attached report on the upcoming 18th All-American Council, which included a draft agenda and details of local organization and arrangements in preparation for the Council. He reported that the Preconciliar Commission is recommending the nomination of Archpriest Peter Baktis and Judge E.R. Lanier as vice-chairmen of the 18th All-American Council

H.1. MOTION MIKHALEVSKY/WEREMEDIC – to accept the nomination of Archpriest Peter Baktis and Judge E.R. Lanier as vice-chairmen of the 18th All-American Council. CARRIED.

I. Legal matters (attached)

Judge E.R. Lanier, Chairman of the Legal Committee, presented its attached report. He noted that a search for a new General Counsel for the OCA is underway. He also reported that the OCA is not subject to any litigation against it at the present time. He noted the significance of the court ruling the previous week allowing the Diocese of South Carolina to secede with its assets from the Episcopal Church. He then presented background information on land tracts in South Canaan, PA belonging to the long defunct St. Tikhon's Orphanage and the need to transfer ownership of these properties in order to dissolve the orphanage corporation. As St. Tikhon's is under the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan, all parties involved in the land transfer have requested a resolution of the Metropolitan Council to finalize the transactions. Once all formalities have been completed, the Orphanage Corporation and its Board will be dissolved. A vote on the resolution was deferred until the following morning so that copies of the resolution could be distributed to all Metropolitan Council members.

Gregory Nescott noted that Judge Lanier's term on the Metropolitan Council is expiring and reflected on his invaluable and selfless work for the Church. He suggested that Judge Lanier be appointed to replace him as a special legal consultant to the Metropolitan Council.

I.1. MOTION METROPOLITAN TIKHON/JURY – To wholeheartedly express profound gratitude to Judge E.R. Lanier for his extraordinary and dedicated work for the church over many years, including most recently as chairman of the Metropolitan Council's Legal Committee. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY (with 1 abstention – Lanier).

The session was adjourned with prayer at 6:03 PM.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 11, 2015

Following the celebration of a Divine Liturgy at Saint Sergius Chapel at 8:00 AM, the meeting was opened with prayer led by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon at the Immaculate Conception Seminary at 10:55 AM.

Legal matters continued with presentation of the resolution on St. Tikhon's Orphanage land transfers in South Canaan, PA.

L.2. MOTION DRESKO/MYERS - The Orthodox Church in America (OCA) has no monetary or proprietary interest in real estate and improvements located in South Canaan, Wayne County, Pennsylvania, currently titled in the name of ST. TIKHON RUSSIAN ORTHODOX ORPHANAGE, a/k/a ST. TIKON' RUSSIAN ORTHODOX ORPHANAGE, a/k/a ST. TIKHON' RUSSIAN ORTHODOX ORPHANAGE, a Non-Profit Corporation, South Canaan, Pennsylvania County of Wavne, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (The Orphanage.) This property is the same premises conveyed to St. Tikhon Russian Orthodox Orphanage, by way of Deed of Metropolitan Theophilus N. Pashkovsky, which Deed was executed on July 18, 1940 and is recorded in the Wayne County Recorder of Deeds Office to Deed Book 147, Page 460 on September 26, 1940. The premises is also described in Deed of St. Tickhon's Russian Monasterv Cemetery Association to St. Tikhon Russian Orthodox Orphanage, which Deed was executed on July 18, 1940 and is recorded in the Wayne County Recorder of Deeds Office to Deed Book 147, Page 461 on September 26, 1940. It consists, in total, of 7.374 acres, more or less:

Be it further resolved that in accordance with the Statute of The Orthodox Church in America, including, but not necessarily limited to, Article V, Section 4g, we hereby approve now and forever after the transfer of said lands as follows:

- 1.933 acres of land more or less, identified as "LOT 1" on a minor subdivision map of lands of St. Tikhon Orthodox Orphanage dated April 5, 2013 and recorded to Wayne County Map Book 118, Page 117, PIN# 24-0-0271-0040.0002, to be transferred for the sum of ONE (\$1.00) DOLLAR to THE DIOCESE OF PHILADELPHIA AND EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA OF THE ORTHODOX CHURCH IN AMERICA, of 144 St. Tikhon's Road, Waymart, County of Wayne and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 18472, and
- 5.441 acres of land more or less, identified as "REMAINING LAND OF ORPHANAGE PARCEL D.B. 147, P. 461" on a minor subdivision map of lands of St. Tikhon Orthodox Orphanage dated April 5, 2013 and recorded to Wayne County Map Book 118, Page 117, PIN# 24-0-0271-0040.0003, to be transferred for the sum of ONE (\$1.00) DOLLAR to ST. TIKHONS GREEK RUSSIAN ORTHODOX CHURCH, a Pennsylvania Non-profit Corporation, D/B/A ST. TIKHON'S MONASTERY, of 175 St. Tikhon's Road, Waymart, County of Wayne and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 18472,

The subdivision of the Orphanage property into these two parcels is further approved;

Furthermore, the OCA approves the lease to St. Tikhon's Orthodox Theological Seminary of the former Orphanage Building located on the parcel that is to be transferred to St. Tikhon's Monastery for \$1.00 for a term of 99 years from a beginning date to be established by the parties thereto;

We further approve and authorize the responsible authority(ies) for each of the aforementioned entities to execute any and all documents and take any and all actions now and after today's date for all time, to accomplish the same. CARRIED with 4 abstentions (due to possible conflict of interest as members of St. Tikhon's Orphanage Board): Metropolitan Tikhon, Fr. John Jillions, Judge E.R. Lanier, David Yeosock.

K. Statute Revision Task Force

Archpriest Alexander Rentel, Secretary of the Statute Revision Task Force, presented an oral report on the work of the Task Force since last fall. He highlighted some of the new elements in the revised statute and explained the reasoning behind them. He noted that once review of the draft text by a legislative editor, which is currently underway, is completed, the blessing of the Holy Synod will be requested to disseminate and post it online for public comment, which is likely to occur next week. He encouraged church-wide discussion of the draft text and organization of town hall meetings locally for such discussion. Questions and discussion ensued.

J. Reorganization Committee (attached)

Archpriest John Shimchick, chairperson of the Committee, presented its attached report. Fr. Eric Tosi presented a detailed Department Reorganization Proposal. Extensive discussion ensued.

M. Metropolitan Council Committees

M.1. Charity (attached)

Protodeacon Michael Myers summarized the Charity Committee's attached written report.

M.2. Crisis Management Team

Fr. Eric Tosi indicated that Crisis Management issues were presented in his Secretary's Report.

M.3. Ethics

Dr. Paul Meyendorff, Committee Chairman, indicated that the Committee has nothing to report at this time.

M.4. Human Resources

Archpriest David Garretson, Committee Chairman, indicated that the Committee has nothing to report at this time.

M.5. Internal Governance (attached)

Archpriest Chad Hatfield highlighted the committee's attached report. He reiterated that the Metropolitan Council Members Handbook would be updated once the revised Statute is adopted.

Following a recess for lunch at 12:33 PM, the afternoon session was called to order at 1:33 PM.

N. Treasurer's Report (attached)

Melanie Ringa presented the attached Treasurer's report and additional material. She noted that preliminary financials for 2014 indicate a net surplus of \$32,000. She then highlighted the budget for the 18th All-American Council. Melanie then reported on her visits to dioceses and the recent diocesan chancellors and treasurers meeting and discussions there of statute revision pertaining to funding of the OCA. She indicated

that the Finance Committee prepared the church funding provisions for the revised Statute, which remove "per capita" language in the article on the parish. A lengthy discussion ensued concerning proportional giving and the formulation of an appropriate resolution for presentation to the upcoming All-American Council. The question was asked as to why the non-territorial dioceses were not included in the funding resolution being discussed. Melanie and His Beatitude explained that the non-territorial dioceses funding arrangements were subject to separate agreements, not by the OCA Statute.

Following a short recess at 3:47 PM, the session resumed at 4:10 PM.

The following resolution was discussed. Several amendments were made but not accepted. The original resolution was submitted to a vote by the Metropolitan Council and defeated.

N.1. MOTION - JURY/DRESKO – The Metropolitan Council recommends the following resolution for adoption by the 18th All-American Council: "In order to facilitate the transition of the dioceses to a proportional funding model, while supporting the work of the national church, the Treasurer of the Orthodox Church in America shall come to an agreement with each diocese on a funding methodology. The funding level shall not fall below the 2015 assessment. The target range for contributions will be the greater of the 2015 baseline or 33% of diocesan revenue." DEFEATED (0 votes in favor, 2 abstentions: Jury, Myers).

After further discussion, the following resolution was discussed, later amended but finally withdrawn.

N.2. MOTION – DRESKO/HATFIELD – The Metropolitan Council recommends the following resolution for adoption by the 18th All-American Council: "In order to facilitate the transition of the dioceses to a proportional funding model, while supporting the work of the national church, each territorial diocese of the OCA shall remit annually financial support of the work of the central administration in an amount no less than the greater of 1) an amount equal to the 2015 assessment amount, with an allowance of a 4% decrease in cases of diocesan need; OR 2) 33% of annual diocesan revenue.

It was agreed that a drafting group should reformulate the resolution for presentation during that evening's session.

Following a recess for dinner at 5:18 PM, the evening session was called to order at 6:33 PM.

The drafting group presented the following resolution, which was discussed and adopted.

N.3. MOTION – DRESKO/HATFIELD – The Metropolitan Council recommends the following resolution for adoption by the 18th All-American Council: "In order to facilitate the transition of the dioceses to a proportional funding model, while supporting the work of the national church, for the budget years 2016, 2017 and 2018, each diocese of the Orthodox Church in America shall annually remit its diocesan financial obligation for the work of the central administration in an amount no less than the greater of 1) the 2015 assessment, with a 4% decrease permissible in cases of diocesan need as determined by the Metropolitan Council with the approval of the Holy Synod of Bishops; or 2) 33% of total annual diocesan revenue." CARRIED with 1 vote opposed (Mitchell) and 1 abstention (Myers).

It was suggested that the resolution be presented to the All-American Council with explanatory background information.

O. Financial Development Committee

David Yeosock, Chairman of the Financial Development Committee, presented a brief oral report on upcoming projects in this area, particularly in conjunction with the upcoming All-American Council.

P. Finance/Investment Committee

Priest Gleb McFatter, chairman of the Finance/Investment Committee, presented a brief oral report concerning the transfer of the investment portfolio of the Orthodox Church in America to the Philadelphia Trust Company. Melanie Ringa thanked the Finance Committee for its hard work, particularly in formulating financial provisions within the revised OCA Statute. She noted that Fr. McFatter's term on the Metropolitan Council is expiring. The Council expressed warm appreciation for his work as chairman of the Finance Committee.

Q. Open Discussion

At the request of Metropolitan Council members, open discussion took place on three topics.

• The Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America

Metropolitan Tikhon distributed for discussion a draft text of a fuller response on canonical restructuring from the Holy Synod to the Assembly of Bishops. He invited input and suggestions from Metropolitan Council members.

• Editorial policy of the Orthodox Church in America

Metropolitan Tikhon stressed the need for a pastoral approach on this issue. It was suggested that a comprehensive editorial policy is needed for anything published by the OCA, whether on its websites or elsewhere in order to ensure consistency or nothing contradict its teachings. It was noted that that editorial policies do exist but that input is welcome towards further developing them. It was also stated that the internet and social media are not conducive to communicating nuance, but that, nevertheless, the internet is perhaps the most effective vehicle to reach out to youth. As this issue is within the competence of the Holy Synod, it was respectfully suggested that the Synod should establish a Communication Commission to further develop uniform editorial policies and to address other related issues.

• Theological education and seminaries

Metropolitan Tikhon stated that the Church must highly value theological education and that support from the entire Church must be further encouraged and that is paramount to our mission as a Church. There was some discussion of the future of our seminaries in view of declining church membership and resources. It was stressed that residential formation at a seminary is essential in the preparation of clergy for the Church. The need for other education in the Church was also discussed including catechesis and formation of the laity. Various programs and internet resources were mentioned. The recently announced joint publication initiative of St. Vladimir's Seminary Press and St. Tikhon's Monastery Press was commended as a positive step. Metropolitan Tikhon said that the Holy Synod will seek to develop a creative vision for a comprehensive approach for education at all levels throughout the Church.

The session was adjourned with prayer at 8:23 PM.

THURSDAY FEBRUARY 12, 2015

The morning session was opened with prayer at 9:03 AM.

U. External Affairs Report (attached)

Protopresbyter Leonid Kishkovsky, Director of External Affairs and Interchurch Relations, delivered the attached report, providing additional comments and insights. Metropolitan Tikhon and others also provided additional information and discussion ensued.

S. Pension Board Report

Fr. Gleb McFatter delivered a brief oral report. He reported that the OCA Pension Plan investment return for the past year was 5.48% below the target of 7%, which was due to prevailing global economic climate, especially in the fourth quarter. Fr. McFatter, Maureen Ahearn, Pension Plan Administrator, and Warren Rivetz, money manager and advisor for the OCA Pension Board, answered questions from Metropolitan Council members.

U. External Affairs Report (continued)

Presentation and discussion of the attached report on External Affairs and Interchurch Relations continued.

Following a short recess at 10:26 AM, the session resumed at 10:35 AM.

T. Department/Organization Reports

T.1. RBO (attached)

Mr. Basil Russin, Vice President of the Russian Brotherhood Organization (RBO) of the USA, delivered an oral report with the attached PowerPoint presentation. He presented its new logo and relayed its history, programs and services, as, currently, the only Orthodox fraternal benefit society in America. He stressed the Organization's strong connection to the Church over many decades.

U. External Affairs Report (continued)

Presentation and discussion of the attached report on External Affairs and Interchurch Relations was concluded.

T. Department/Organization Reports (continued)

T.2. FOCA (attached)

Archpriest Theodore Boback, Spiritual Advisor, and Dr. John Shultz, Immediate Past President, presented the attached report and PowerPoint presentation on the Fellowship of Orthodox Christians in America (FOCA). They highlighted its history, current projects and activities. They also invited everyone to participate in events of the annual FOCA Convention, which will be held this year in conjunction with the 18th All-American Council.

V. Future Meeting Dates

Fr. Tosi reminded everyone that the Metropolitan Council would next meet in Atlanta over dinner on July 20, 2015, just prior to the opening of the 18th All-American Council. The next regular meeting of the Metropolitan Council will take place on September 22-24, with a retreat on September 21.

W. Adjournment

In concluding remarks, Metropolitan Tikhon thanked everyone for a productive meeting. He noted that although some issues were rightly referred to the Holy Synod, he encouraged Metropolitan Council members to carry issues forward to their dioceses for further discussion, and that such synergy is a manifestation of hierarchy and conciliarity.

The edition would be between 36 and 40 pages, if printed 4-up, or 32 and 40 pages if printed 8up. Other specs would be the same as TOC -- same glossy paper, mailed in bulk to parishes but also permanently available on-line in PDF format for downloading, etc.

Theme: Mission and Evangelization

The overall theme would pick up where the 18th AAC left off rather than be a "report" or "compilation" of that discussed/presented at the AAC. In other words, "having discussed 'all that,' what do we now 'do' with it?"

Broader scope

It's just my opinion, but if we're going to do an annual "journal," each edition should have a specific theme that features articles that are not only of the theoretical/theological nature, but a practical one as well. In time, this will produce a series of themed publications that will be useful well beyond the immediate date of publication. Future themes should mirror our departments -- religious education, youth, lay ministry, stewardship, etc. Hence, each edition of the "journal series" would provide an introductory "resource" with a number of related articles, all "in one place."

Format

The old "TOC" format would be the most efficient, although the layout would be more formal -- a more serious "journal" format rather than the more "casual" TOC format. Of course, illustrations -- especially photos of people actually doing the things noted in each article -- would be featured.

Proposed contents

Considering the theme of evangelization/mission, the following would seem to "hit upon" the main subthemes. Exact titles can be changed, of course, as can the list of writers. While I have no intense opinion with regard to authors, it would be good to avoid contacting people who cannot write well, as was the case with some of the "reflections" submitted for the 18th AAC which, in a few instances, were unusable as submitted.

Editing

All articles should be edited for consistency, style, etc. I assume that I would be doing this, if this is your pleasure. I also assume that I'll be doing the layout and providing a "camera-ready product," so to speak. Of course, if you would prefer that someone else do this, I will in no way whine about it. I would caution against editing or writing "by committee," so to speak, as this often becomes counterproductive and tremendously time consuming. I will gladly contact each potential author and explain their individual tasks, deadlines, etc. If, within a reasonable period of time, a requested author fails to respond, then we'll simply find an alternative author.

CONTENT OUTLINE

1. Inside cover -- Introduction by Fr. John Jillions *This would be an "editorial" of sorts.*

2. Feature article -- "To Love Is To Remember" by Fr. Alexander Schmemann *I'll make reference to this in the intro/unsigned editorial.*

3. Second feature article -- "Facing Forward: Expanding the Mission" by Metropolitan Tikhon This would be a general introduction that picks up where the AAC left off, so to speak, highlighting Metropolitan Tikhon's points/vision for "where we are going" in the immediate and distant future.

SERIES OF ARTICLES ON VARIOUS ASPECTS OF MISSION/EVANGELIZATION

4. "Defining Mission" by Fr. E. Tosi This should provide
1. a general introduction to the mission of Christ and the Church.
2. a broader understanding as understood in his thesis.
3. an understanding of how this would be applied in North America.

5. "Principles of Evangelizaton" by Fr. J. Parker *Title is self-explanatory, but content should be very specific.*

6. "Evangelization in Action" by Joseph Kormos Again, title is self-explanatory, but content would offer clear steps/actions/ways to evangelize.

7. "Internal Evangelizaton: Building Conviction and Renewing Commitment to Christ among 'our own'" by Fr. Jonathan Ivanoff How to evangelize "our own people" before "sending them out" to evangelize others.

8. "External Evangelization: Taking the Good News beyond 'our walls'" by Fr. Stephen Freeman *Preparing others to receive the Gospel and how to share it with those so prepared.*

9. "Matthew 25 Evangelization" by Donna Karabin Sharing the Good News in light of the Parable of the Sheep and Goats.

10. "Christian Education as Evangelization" by Valerie Zahirsky Sharing the Gospel in Church school, VCS, community educational settings.

11. "Sharing the Gospel with Tweens and Teens" by [need suggestion here] *Title is self-explanatory and should cover such things as classes, retreats, etc.*

12. "Evangelization on Campus" by Fr. John Reeves or Deacon ?? from his parish *Again, title is self-explanatory.*

13. "Evangelizing the Broader Community" by Fr. Ambrose Arrington His mission to the broader Bixby, OK community is a "case study," so to speak -- what "principles" could be derived therefrom?

Searching for the relics of St. Jacob Netsvetov

SITKA, AK – In conjunction with a National Park Service [NPS] project to restore a portion of Sitka National Park to its appearance in Russian colonial times, a search for the burial site and relics of St. Jacob Netsvetov recently began.

In a meeting with NPS reps, His Grace, Bishop David mentioned the possibility of locating the relics which, if found, would be enshrined in Sitka's historic St. Michael Cathedral. Cornell University's Dr. Thomas Urban arrived in Sitka where, with the help of a "ground penetrating radar" device, scanning was initiated.

It is suspected that St. Jacob was interred near the entrance to a church that once stood on the site, but its exact location remains unknown. Born on Atka Island in 1802, the son of a Russian father and Aleut mother, St. Jacob was Orthodox Christianity's first North American-born priest. His tireless missionary efforts brought about the conversion of many across Alaska's Yukon River region. "On September 1, 1989, the late Ecumenical Patriarch Demetrios I issued the first message from the Ecumenical Throne on the environment," wrote His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon, in a letter sent to all parishes in late August, in which he urges use of the study guide. "The Church again seeks to remind us, as Mary reminded Martha, of the one needful thing - life and unity with Our Lord. God and Savior. Jesus Christ Patriarch Demetrios I reminds us that the holv fathers of the Church teach that 'man is the prince of creation, endowed with the privilege of freedom. Being partaker simultaneously of the material and the spiritual world, he was created in order to refer creation back to the Creator, in order that the world may be saved from decay and death.'

"As the summer draws to a close and children go back to or away to school for the first time and begin again a new academic year and ecclesiastical year, let us... take a moment to turn to the one needful thing in praise, worship and thanksgiving for the creation and all the blessings bestowed upon us by our merciful Creator."

St Katherine's is a growing remarkably under the capable leadership of Fr Andrew Cuneo. I will visit St Katherine parish the first week in December 2015. Will finish second year and begin third year grant, with a blessing. St Nektarios Mission has a strong foundation, which has been supported and encouraged strongly by the Diocese, whose Cathedral has essentially planted this mission south of Dallas. They are completing Diocesan Planting grant which allowed them to solidify the work of a part-time priest. The grant should push them to the next level. St Nektarios is a snapshot of a model Planting Grant Mission at their current stage.

Accept New:

St Juvenaly and His Companion Diocese of Alaska

Wasilla, AK Fr Mikel Bock

The St Juvenaly Mission has demonstrated over three years a tremendous amount of growth and a spirit of devotion and hard work. Originally, the Mission applied for the grant in order to build a building—and this Grant, in its basic structure, is not for that purpose. During the past two years, the mission has grown in spirit and in numbers, and has been able to build a proper church building and parish hall. Someone once described perseverance as "stick-to-it-iveness". This Mission has demonstrated perseverance for these years, and I believe it is time for St Juvenaly to benefit from the Grant. It is also important, in my judgment, for the Diocese of Alaska to shine, and this is one facet of that hope.

Explanation of Recommendations—Not at this time:

Annunciation Mission is a remarkably devoted mission. They have moved from various temporary spaces to the converted garage of the priest's residence. The parishioners have poured in copious amounts of equity, in addition to their financial support to establish a more permanent, beautiful, intentional space for their services.

Annunciation appears to be growing steadily and strongly. The numbers are slightly on the small side, and a significant portion of their financial support comes from supporters outside the mission. The priest works a full-time business he owns (web design) and has come to that point of stagnation in growth because of the time necessity required for earning a living outside the mission.

Their basic approach to missionary life, commitment to liturgical services, to beauty, and outreach are marks of a solid mission. This is a mission to keep an eye on; recommend re-application for 2017 consideration.

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Additional Pastoral Note:

This year, for the first time in a while, the Grants are heavy in two dioceses South and West. I am very cognizant of this situation, and personally would hope for representation across the breadth of the OCA.

Nevertheless, based strictly on the guidelines of the Grant and the basic possibilities of accomplishing the end-goal of a full-time priest now, and upon graduation from the grant, the missions I have recommended this round are in that rank order. The Priests and their missions do speak for themselves in this way, regardless of their dioceses.

In the South, it is also the case that, if blessed by the Synod, not only would there be two missions from the Diocese on the grant, but the priests are brothers. I am also aware of the potential murmurs that such a decision might raise, but given the nature of the grant, the strength of the missions, and when they applied (one would be in second year, one in first year), I cannot recommend *against* Waxahachie simply because of a fraternal relation to another planting grant priest.



With the Blessing of The Holy Synod, the Pension Board is presenting the following proposal for consideration by the Metropolitan council:

Mission Parish Priest Retirement benefits

Purpose: The following parameters are identified to accommodate retired priests who choose to serve in a mission parish without affecting their pension.

- 1) Priest must be of retirement age (over 65 years of age).
- 2) Priest can only serve in any one mission parish for a total of two years and may serve in multiple mission parishes.
- 3) Mission parish must be in existence less than 5 years.
- Mission parish must be servicing less than 50 souls (defined as any man, woman, or child)
- 5) Parish must be providing less than \$2000/month (\$24,000/year) total compensation which includes value of provided housing or housing allowance, salary, insurance, and any and all reimbursements (e.g. car, gas, phone, internet, meals, subscriptions, registration fees)
- 6) While participating in this program, both church and priest contributions to the pension plan will not be required.
- 7) Documentation of these parameters will be required as designated by pension board.
- 8) Each mission parish must apply for inclusion in this program.

Report of the Metropolitan Council Legal Committee

Fall Meeting of the Metropolitan Council of the Orthodox Church in America September 21-24, 2015

Introduction

The Metropolitan Council Legal Committee was created by Resolution of the Metropolitan Council, and blessed by the Holy Synod, at the Spring 2008 Metropolitan Council meeting.¹ That Resolution, which is set forth both in the meeting minutes and in the Metropolitan Council Member Handbook, provides as follows:

"The Metropolitan Council Legal Committee, consisting of at least three to five members, shall between meetings of the Metropolitan Council act for and on behalf of the Metropolitan Council to discharge its legal responsibilities. The Legal Committee shall work in conjunction with the General Counsel and members of the Central Administration. Responsibility for major policy and legal decisions, such as initiation of litigation and settlement of litigation, shall be retained by the Metropolitan Council as a whole. The Legal Committee shall fully and promptly report to the Metropolitan Council its activities and decisions between meetings. The Legal Committee shall act by majority vote. The Legal Committee may act by telephonic meeting or consent evidenced in writing or email, or such other means as means that the Legal Committee shall determine to be useful or appropriate."

(It is to be noted that, as currently configured, the Legal Committee consists of just two members, rather than the required three to five members.)

It has always been the goal of the Legal Committee to use its semi-annual reporting opportunities to ensure that each member of the Metropolitan Council is well-informed regarding matters of current legal interest or concern to the Orthodox Church in America, insofar as these matters reasonably relate to the function and role of the Metropolitan Council in the overall governance of the Church, as that role is defined in the Statute of the OCA.

The OCA Statute

Delegates to the 18th All-American Council overwhelmingly adopted the proposed revisions to the Statute of the Orthodox Church in America, in a 473 to 15 vote, during the AAC's Second Plenary Session on Tuesday morning, July 21, 2015. The Revised Statute becomes effective November 1, 2015. Under the terms of the Revised Statute, the competencies of the Metropolitan Council have been redefined and clarified. Article V, Section 7 of the Revised Statute reads in pertinent part,

"The following matters are within the competence of the Metropolitan Council. The Metropolitan Council shall:

- a. Implement the decisions of the All-American Council and continue the work of the All-American Council between sessions in the areas of its competence;
- b. Assist the Metropolitan and the Holy Synod in implementing decisions within its competence; ...
- k. Initiate, prosecute, and defend all legal matters affecting the interests of the Church ... "

With those competencies in mind, and continuing to follow the mandate given to the Legal Committee in its enabling resolution, the following report presents the current state of various legal issues now confronting the OCA.

General Counsel Search Committee

As Chair of the Legal Committee, I was also asked to Chair the Search Committee charged with identifying and recommending to the Holy Synod a candidate to serve as General Counsel for the OCA. In addition to the Chair, the Search Committee consists of Father John Jillions, Father Eric Tosi, Judge E.R. Lanier, Professor Paul Meyendorff and Gregg Nescott.

In response to a Job Description of the General Counsel position, ably drafted by Judge Lanier earlier this year and circulated just prior to the All-American Council, seven applications were received by the submission deadline of August 10. On August 22, the Search Committee held a conference call to review each application. At the direction of the Search Committee, the Chair contacted one of the candidates for additional information. We hope to make a recommendation to the Holy Synod in time for its next meeting in October.

The Obergefell Decision.

It is critical that the OCA have a General Counsel with expertise both in general litigation as well as issues of First Amendment protections. As you may be aware, less than a month before the All-American Council, the United States Supreme Court issued its ruling in *Obergefell v. Hodges*, 576 U.S. ____ (2015), which held that the fundamental right to marry is guaranteed to same-sex couples by both the Due Process Clause and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. The ramifications of this decision are vast and will likely have an impact on the manner in which the Church hires new employees, takes on volunteers, conducts future business relationships, and how the Church will be treated by secular courts. This decision will likely have an effect on health insurance issues, child protection issues, clergy housing allowances, married student housing at our seminaries, liability insurance coverage issues and it could potentially impact the Church's tax-exempt status.

This decision heightens the concerns raised by Judge Lanier in his Spring 2015 Report of the Legal Committee in his discussion of the decision of the 10th Circuit's decision in *EEOC v. Abercrombie & Fitch Stores, Inc.*²

Re:	Revised Statute Implementation

On Tuesday, July 21, 2015, at the Second Plenary Session, the delegates to the 18th All-American Council, overwhelmingly adopted the revision of the Statute of the Orthodox Church in America. The overwhelming support for the new Statute showed by the 18th AAC is a testimony to the calm and conducive atmosphere, which allowed for such work, that the Metropolitan and Holy Synod provided for the Church. By supporting the revision of the Statute, the AAC recognized that the new Statute was the result of professional, collaborative, and careful work of the Statute Revision Task Force, and, as such, appropriate for adoption at this point in the life of the Church.

In the newly adopted Statute, in the Article XVIII – Effective Date, the effective date for the new Statute is Sunday, November 1, 2015. On that date, because the proposed Statute was accepted by the 18^{th} AAC, in accordance with Article XIII of the current Statute, the new Statute will go into effect and replace the current one. Nothing further need be done by anyone or any body in the Church for the new Statute to go into effect.

The Commission on Canons and Statute, the Church body that did the final review of the proposed Statute Revision and wrote this proposed article, set November 1, 2015, as the effective date so that if the proposed Statute was adopted, and subsequently something was found amiss in the Statute, the Metropolitan Council and the Holy Synod would have met and could address any issues that might arise at their meetings. To the best of my knowledge, nothing has arisen in regard to the Statute since its adoption that would require the Metropolitan Council or the Holy Synod to take any action.

This same article directs that "Dioceses, Parishes, monasteries, institutions, offices, and organizations of the Church shall review their governing documents and administrative practices and conform them to the Statute by December 31, 2017." The Commission on Canons and Statute provided this lengthy period so that the governing documents of the Church could be carefully brought into conformity with the new Statute.

For the most part, this work will not require too much effort. It will require Church officials at all levels, beginning with the members of the Holy Synod and continuing on to any group in the Church that has any governing documents (by-laws, Statutes, constitutions, *Typika*, etc.), to examine their governing documents and bring them inline with the relevant part of the Statute.

In its work, the Task Force introduced little that was new into the proposed Statute revision. Where it did so, the Task Force did so with the greatest care and with the strong feelings that the Church required statutory protection in these matters. Perhaps the most notable places where the Task Force introduced something can be found in three places: 1. Article XIII – Monasticism, and 2. Article XIV – Stavropegial Institutions. In both instances, the Task Force drafted these articles from scratch, because there are no articles covering them in the current Statute. As such, Monasteries and

Stavropegial Institutions will have to take care to read carefully through the respective articles and bring their governing documents in conformity with the new Statute.

The third instance can be found in Article VII – The Diocese, Section 3: Diocesan Bylaws. The new Statute requires first that each Diocese have Bylaws and, second, that these Bylaws have the following provisions:

a. The nomination of a Diocesan Bishop in accordance with Article VIII, Sections 5-7;

b. The composition and election of the Diocesan Council;

c. The appointment, dismissal, and duties of Diocesan Officers;

d. The terms of office, method of election, and duties of the Diocesan Auditing Committee, and,

e. The amendment of the Diocesan Bylaws.

With the two-year period provided for, Dioceses should easily be able to revise their governing documents and bring them into conformity with the new Statute.

The new Statute revision also requires the Church at all levels to maintain with all care the patrimony and records and archives of the Church. The following requirements for this preservation work can be found in the following places in the Statute:

Safeguarding the Patrimony of the Church

Article IV – The Metropolitan, Section 2(0) and Section 3 Article V – The Metropolitan Council, Section 7(i) Article VI – Church Officers, Section 3 Article VIII – The Diocesan Bishop, Section 2(f) Article X – The Diocesan Council, Sections 6(0) and 7

On Records and Archives

Article VI – Church Offices, Section 3(g) Article VIII – The Diocesan Bishop, Section 2(g) Article X – The Diocesan Council, Section 7 Article XII – The Parish, Sections 3(b)(vi) and 9(d) Article XIV – Stavropegial Institutions, Section 2

Finally, all levels of the Church need to be aware that the new Statute has incorporated the Resolution on the Property Held in Trust, passed by the 13th All-American Council in Orlando, Florida, in July 2002. The provisions from this resolution can be found in Article XII – The Parish, Section 9, and Article XIII – Monasticism, Section 4.
