TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 2014

Following an all-day retreat for the Metropolitan Council on Christian Stewardship conducted by Priest Robert Holet on Monday September 22, 2014, His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon celebrated a prayer service at 9:05 AM on Tuesday morning to open the meeting at the Immaculate Conception Seminary.

A. Agenda: Introduction

The meeting was then called to order. Fr. John Jillions welcomed everyone and indicated a change in the agenda in the transfer of the ORSMA and SMPAC reports to Thursday.

B. Roll Call/Approval of Minutes of Previous Meetings (attached)

Fr. Eric Tosi then conducted the roll call and announced guests who would be present at various points during this meeting (see participants list). He requested approval of Alexis Liberovsky as recording secretary for the

meeting, which was accepted without objection. He presented the draft minutes of the previous meeting of the Metropolitan Council on February 4-6, 2014 for approval.

B.1. MOTION LANIER/HATFIELD — To accept the previous meeting minutes of February 4-6, 2014 as presented. CARRIED with one abstention (Mikhalevsky).

E. Metropolitan's Report

Metropolitan Tikhon welcomed everyone and expressed gratitude for the previous day's fruitful retreat, which he was unable to attend. He noted the falling asleep of former Metropolitan Council members, Dr. Dmitri Solodow and Leda Dzwonczyk. He highlighted his activities since the last Metropolitan Council meeting. He noted that his previous report was in the form of a "Focused Statement of Purpose", which he has since also discussed with the Boards of St. Tikhon's and St. Vladimir's Seminaries, the diocesan chancellors and treasurers at their annual meeting, the clergy of the Archdiocese of Washington, the annual meeting of St. Nicholas Cathedral in Washington, DC, the Mission Focus Group and other gatherings. This discussion has refocused the statement into three main areas: missions and evangelism, clergy health and the strengthening of the Church's institutions, particularly monasteries and seminaries. He reflected on the period since the 2011 All-American Council leading up to next year's All-American Council as one of the most productive in terms of consistency, implementation and follow-up between Councils, which has been accomplished through the Strategic Plan Post-Conciliar Committee and throughout the Church. He thanked both the Statute Revision Task Force and the Office of the Treasurer for efforts to develop a funding system transition from assessments for their hard work in preparation for the upcoming All-American Council next year. He then reflected further on the three aforementioned focus areas. In mission and evangelism, he noted the upcoming establishment through an endowment of the mission school and the work of all OCA departments. Regarding clergy health, he highlighted the new programs facilitated by the Department of Continuing Education and the excellent and professional work of ORSMA, particularly in the prevention of sexual misconduct. Concerning seminaries and monasteries, he noted their crucial significance for the life of the Church and indicated that the Chancellor's recommendation pertaining to seminaries will be deliberated by the Holy Synod and with the seminaries. Regarding monasticism, he spoke of the fruitful first synaxis of monastery superiors that took place in July allowing them to confer on areas of common concern while endeavoring jointly to strengthen the vital presence of monasticism in the Church. He noted that such monastic gatherings would be convened regularly. Touching on administrative matters, he indicated that an annual review of the officers and staff has not yet been done but will be by the end of the year. He expressed profound gratitude for the productive and selfless work of the officers, chancery staff and the members of the Metropolitan Council. Metropolitan Tikhon reflected on the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America, which was held the previous week. He highlighted the inspiring presentations at the gathering by the Assembly's various agencies, which offer concrete programs and activities that manifest the de facto unity of the Orthodox Churches in the United States. He indicated that Canada now has its own Assembly of Bishops. He spoke of very constructive discussions at the meeting on the means by which this de facto unity might be made more real in terms of the administrative unity for which we are striving. He said that while it is clear that there are strong differences of opinion on whether this administrative unity is even desirable, there is a definite sense that some something must be done to strengthen our cooperation. He referred to two proposals being considered by the Assembly, each being an expansion of a proposal that was presented at last year's Assembly. He further explained that the first proposal envisions a 10-year period of autonomy under the direction, not of one, but of all the Patriarchs and Heads of the Autocephalous Churches, to be concluded with the granting of autocephaly. The second proposal is less specific concerning the overall administrative structure and encourages a more active role of the present Assembly Committees and the concrete alignment of existing departments and organizations of each jurisdiction. The Holy Synod of the OCA made a formal (but preliminary) response to these proposals, noting that each has positive and negative points, but emphasizing that our focus first needs to be on the ultimate goal of this process. In our understanding, this goal can only be a fully functioning local autocephalous Church with a proper Holy Synod, which elects its own primate. Since no conclusion was reached on the validity of either plan presented, it was decided that the Committee on Canonical Regional Planning would continue to review the plans. However, it was also decided that each

jurisdiction would prepare a more formal response to the question within six months for the Committee to consider. While there is and will certainly continue to be hesitation about any kind of movement forward, there was positive response from members of other jurisdictions. Metropolitan Tikhon indicated his intention to follow up on the Holy Synod's preliminary response by drafting a more detailed proposal for possible canonical restructuring based on an end goal of autocephaly. This draft will be sent to a number of OCA clergy and laity who have expertise in those areas where more details might need to be fleshed out (canonical/historical, pastoral, practical). In concluding his report, Metropolitan Tikhon said that it is important for us, as the OCA, to continue humbly to present our vision of a local Church here in North America. To do this, we must continue our present course with faith, hope and love and place our energies into developing and enhancing the great work that is already being done throughout the Orthodox Church in America. An extensive discussion by the Metropolitan Council concerning the Assembly of Bishops and related issues then ensued.

Following a short recess at 11:24 AM, the session resumed at 11:45 AM.

F. Chancellor's Report (attached)

Archpriest John Jillions, Chancellor, presented his oral report, noting that his proposal in the report concerning theological education is being referred to the Holy Synod for further deliberation. He additionally suggested that Metropolitan Tikhon's workload requires the eventual appointment of an auxiliary bishop, noting that 110 clergy are under the direct archpastoral supervision of the Metropolitan.

I. External Affairs Report

Fr. Leonid Kishkovsky, Director of External Affairs and Interchurch Relations, delivered an oral report highlighting a variety of significant issues and events, particularly the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America and the *Preliminary Response of the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America to the Proposals for Canonical Restructuring*, recent events in other Orthodox Churches, Orthodox relations with non-Orthodox religious bodies, recent happenings in ecumenical organizations, as well contacts with various governmental organizations and personalities. He particularly highlighted recent positive contacts with the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the Church of Albania and the Church in Ukraine. Extensive discussion ensued

Following a recess for lunch at 12:30 PM, the afternoon session was called to order at 1:34 PM

Wide-ranging discussion of various issues pertaining to External Affairs and Interchurch Relations continued.

J. Legal matters (attached)

Judge Lanier, Chairman of the Legal Committee, presented its attached report.

J.1. MOTION DRESKO/GALLICK - To move into executive session. CARRIED.

Confidential details pertaining to personnel and pending legal matters were discussed in executive session.

J.2. MOTION GALLICK/JURY - To move out of executive session. CARRIED.

Following a short recess at 3:19 PM, the session resumed at 3:41 PM.

G. Secretary's report (attached)

Archpriest Eric Tosi, OCA Secretary, summarized his attached written report, particularly highlighting work on database rebuilding on the chancery's computer system, the work of the staff, the projected publication of

The Orthodox Church magazine as an annual review, preparation of new metrical books and ongoing maintenance of the chancery building. The possibility of electronic metrical recordkeeping was discussed. He presented the attached mission planting grant recommendations for funding in the coming year submitted by Fr. John Parker from the Department of Evangelization, including three communities continuing in the program (Annapolis, MD, Lansing, NY, Cardiff, CA) and two new communities (Tempe, AZ, Beaufort, SC).

G.1. MOTION WEREMEDIC/VAN DUYN – To approve funding for planting grants in 2015 as presented totaling \$102,000. CARRIED.

Fr. Tosi summarized the attached proposal and progress of plans for the Mission School. He noted that the curriculum, which has been nearly completed, would be practical rather than theoretical. The School is projected to begin functioning in the spring and its sessions will take place in various locations throughout the country. During discussion of the proposal, he noted that students would be both clergy and laity enrolled with the blessing of their diocesan bishops.

Fr. Tosi then presented for approval the attached *Draft Record Retention and Electronic Policy for the Chancery of the Orthodox Church in America*, along with two appendices, which are included for informational purposes only and are not to be considered part of the Policy. He requested approval of the document with the understanding that these policies will be evolving.

G.2. MOTION MIKHALEVSKY/MYERS – To approve the Record Retention and Electronic Policy for the Chancery of the Orthodox Church in America as presented. CARRIED.

G.3. Archives Advisory Committee (attached)

Fr. Tosi introduced Alexis Liberovsky, OCA Archivist, who presented the attached report from the Archives Advisory Committee. He provided additional updates resulting from the Committee's conference call meeting the previous week which decided to proceed with hiring a consultant to evaluate current environmental security in the OCA archives, suggest possible renovations of existing facilities, and appropriate data monitoring of environmental conditions, approved an upcoming preliminary meeting with an architect specialized in museum, library and other construction, and reviewed a draft *OCA Archives collection development and management and deaccessioning policy*,

H. 18th All-American Council (attached)

Fr. Tosi delivered the attached PowerPoint presentation outlining preparations for the 18th All-American Council as well as a draft agenda and noted that organization and arrangements are proceeding smoothly. Extensive discussion took place on various issues pertaining to the 18th All-American Council. Many questions were asked concerning the projected revision of the OCA Statute. Further discussion of this issue was deferred to the presentation of the Statute Revision Task Force report on Thursday.

The session was adjourned with prayer at 5:35 PM

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 2014

Following the celebration of a Divine Liturgy at Saint Sergius Chapel at 8:00 AM, the meeting was opened with prayer led by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon at the Immaculate Conception Seminary at 10:58 AM.

K. Strategic Plan Post-Conciliar Committee (attached)

Fr. John Vitko highlighted his attached report with a PowerPoint presentation. He particularly noted ongoing progress in continuing education programs throughout the Church and parish revitalization initiatives. In

discussion that ensued, he stated that ongoing strategic planning makes sense for the Church as long as it does not replace the Gospel. Our current initiative is more of an activity plan than a strategic plan and its spiritual dimension must be maintained. He reaffirmed that the committee will be phased out at the 18th All-American Council and indicated that many of its activities have transitioned into the normal life of the Church

L. Metropolitan Council Committees

L.1. Charity (attached)

Protodeacon Michael Myers presented the Charity Committee's attached written report. He noted that the committee needs new members. He indicated that more charity funding is needed that would enable the OCA to assist needy clergy among many other worthwhile causes. He suggested that a new page be created on the OCA website to promote more contributions for charities. Discussion ensued.

L.1.A. MOTION MYERS/JURY – That a page be created on the OCA website to provide information on how to donate to the OCA Charity Fund. CARRIED.

L.2. Crisis Management Team

Fr. Eric Tosi presented an oral report regarding the work of the Crisis Management Team. He noted the sensitive nature of its activities and the key role played by Bernard Wilson. He indicated that the team works in concert with the Holy Synod through its Episcopal moderator and the Legal Committee through Judge Lanier. Official statements are carefully crafted and in some cases, it is decided that no statement should be made. He also noted that crisis management training with Bernie Wilson has yet to take place. Responses to questions from the press are issued in writing only to avoid any inconsistencies in official statements. In discussion, it was noted that a definition of crisis was needed along with the development of contingency plans. It was suggested that a generator be acquired for the OCA chancery.

L.3. Ethics

On behalf of Dr. Paul Meyendorff, Committee Chairman, who was absent from this meeting, Fr. Tosi stated that the Ethics Committee has nothing to report at this time.

L.4. Human Resources

Fr. David Garretson presented an oral report, noting that a search for a part-time administrative assistant for stewardship will be taking place. A motion on this matter was tabled until the Treasurer's report. He noted that the Committee would be undertaking revision of the Human Resources and Employee handbooks for the OCA chancery.

L.5. Internal Governance (attached)

Archpriest Chad Hatfield highlighted the committee's attached report. He requested suggestions of topics for future Metropolitan Council retreats, indicating missions and evangelism as a possible subject. He also requested suggestions of people with appropriate professional qualifications to serve on the Audit Committee. He reported that the Metropolitan Council Members Handbook would be revised after Statute revisions are enacted. The need for further clarification of organizational charts for staff and departments was discussed. Various other issues pertaining to OCA governance and structure were extensively deliberated. Melanie Ringa requested the Committee to conduct a search for a new external auditor for the Church.

Following a recess for lunch at 12:33 PM, the afternoon session was called to order at 1:38 PM.

M. Treasurer's Report (attached)

Melanie Ringa highlighted the attached Treasurer's report, with a PowerPoint presentation. The report included the external Audit Reports for 2012 and 2013, 2014 financial statements and the preliminary 2015 budget. She indicated a lower net deficit for 2013 than originally projected of \$54,791. She noted a current operating surplus of \$160,000 due to expenditures under budget.

O. 2015 Budget (attached)

Fr. Gleb McFatter, chairman of the Finance/Investment Committee, and Melanie Ringa presented the proposed balanced budget for 2015. It was noted that the per capita assessment has been lowered from \$92 in 2014 to \$90 for 2015. Fr. John Dresko presented information on the new proportional funding system in lieu of assessments proposed in the Diocese in the West. Discussion and questions on the budget and related issues ensued.

O.1. MOTION WEREMEDIC/DYL - To approve the proposed budget for 2015 as presented. CARRIED.

Melanie Ringa reported a recommendation of the Investment Committee to move OCA endowment investments from the Honesdale National Bank and Wells Fargo Bank to the Philadelphia Trust Company. Discussion and questions ensued.

O.2. MOTION HATFIELD/VAN DUYN – To move the investment portfolio of the Orthodox Church in America from the Honesdale National Bank and Wells Fargo Bank to the Philadelphia Trust Company. CARRIED with two abstentions (Lanier, Vitko).

Fr. David Garretson proposed the following resolution of thanks.

O.3. MOTION GARRETSON/GALLICK – To thank Melanie Ringa, the internal and external auditors, and the Finance Committee for their stewardship in bringing the finances of the Orthodox Church in America to a positive cash flow. CARRIED.

N. Financial Development (attached)

David Yeosock, Chairman of the Financial Development Committee, presented its attached report. He noted the value of the stewardship retreat that took place before this meeting. Discussion of the report ensued.

T. Other Business

Upon a suggestion by Fr. John Jillions, a wide-ranging discussion on clergy health issues took place.

L. Metropolitan Council Committees (continued)

L.1. Charity (continued)

Protodeacon Michael Myers suggested that the current qualifications required to serve on the Charity Committee are too stringent.

L.1.B. MOTION MYERS/DRESKO – That members of the Charity Committee have prior experience in or be willing to undergo training in Best Practices for not-for-profit boards. CARRIED.

The session was adjourned with prayer at 3:24 PM and was followed by committee meetings.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 2014

The morning session was opened with prayer at 9:10 AM.

S. Department Reports

S.1. Military Chaplains (attached)

Archpriests Theodore Boback, Dean and Executive Director of Orthodox Military and VA Chaplains, and Joseph Gallick, Assistant Dean and Deputy Director, presented the attached report. Fr. Boback also briefly outlined the history of the Military Chaplaincy. He thanked Metropolitan Tikhon for his participation in meetings of endorser's conferences. He noted the need for new liturgical items for chaplains as well as icons and publications for distribution in the military and that an Orthodox chaplaincy website is being planned. He highlighted connections with chaplains from other Orthodox Churches throughout the world. Fr. Gallick provided additional specifics on the ministry of chaplains. He appealed for qualified priests to become chaplains. Fr. Boback thanked the Church for its support for chaplaincies and the Fellowship of Orthodox Christians in America (FOCA) for aid it has provided in various ways over many years. Discussion ensued

P. Statute Revision Task Force (attached)

Archpriest Alexander Rentel, Secretary of the Statute Revision Task Force, presented its attached report. He also distributed some samples of Statute articles drafted by the Task Force. Extensive discussion took place. It was indicated that completed articles drafted by the Task Force would be posted online in January to provide sufficient time for comments by clergy and faithful.

P.1. MOTION - GARRETSON/WEREMEDIC – That all completed articles drafted by the Task Force and approved by the Holy Synod be submitted to the Metropolitan Council for its review by December 1, 2014. DEFEATED (16 votes opposed, 10 in favor, 3 abstentions).

U. Future Meeting Dates

Fr. Tosi proposed that the Metropolitan Council meetings in 2015 take place on February 10-12 and September 22-24, with a possible retreat on September 21. These dates were approved by consensus.

Following a short recess at 10:36 AM, the session resumed at 10:51 AM.

F.1. ORSMA

Cindy Davis delivered her report outlining the activities of the Office of Review of Sexual Misconduct Allegations (ORSMA). She outlined case statistics, coordinator activities, communication issues as well as policy and procedure matters. She highlighted her presentation at the Diocese of the South Assembly where there was particular concern about background checks. She noted the productive cooperation of ORSMA and SMPAC. She projected future education efforts on the OCA Policies, Standards and Procedures (PSPs) and sexual misconduct prevention. Questions and discussion ensued, particularly concerning

Q. SMPAC (attached)

Dr. Albert S. Rossi presented the attached written report from the Sexual Misconduct Policy Advisory Committee (SMPAC). Discussion and questions ensued.

R. Pension Board Report

Fr. Gleb McFatter delivered a brief oral report. He reported that the OCA Pension Plan investment return for the past year was 22.71% and that because of the recent change to higher employer contributions a year has been gained towards the full funding of the OCA Pension Plan now projected by 2025. There has been a net gain of two participants in the Plan during the last year.

S. Department Reports (continued)

S.2. Liturgical Music and Translations (attached)

Mr. David Drillock highlighted the attached report from the Department of Liturgical Music and Translations. In conclusion, he noted the importance of choir directors and singers in our liturgical tradition and the need for their proper training. Although the department functions on a small annual budget of \$18,000, the crucial issue for the department is not additional funding but qualified people to accomplish its work.

T. Other Business (continued)

Fr. John Jillions reported that after two years in Moscow, Archimandrite Alexander (Pihach), OCA Representative in Moscow, has obtained a Russian work visa enabling him to have legal signing authority in the administration of the OCA Representation Church in Moscow.

Fr. Eric Tosi provided clarification concerning expenditures of Metropolitan Council members to attend the All-American Council. The expenditures of those members elected by the All-American Council are funded by the OCA, while diocesan representatives are funded by their respective dioceses.

International Orthodox Christian Charities

Relief and Development agency endorsed by the Assembly of Bishops (previously by the Standing Conference of Canonical Orthodox Bishops.) The Orthodox Church in America, together with the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese and the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese, was instrumental in the creation of this pan-Orthodox agency. Significant work has been done by IOCC in Russia, Bosnia, Serbia, Ethiopia, Syria and Lebanon, Israel and Palestine. Domestic disaster-response has been done in the US. Through partnerships with other relief and development agencies IOCC has responded to natural disasters in Asia and other regions. IOCC headquarters is in Baltimore, Maryland. Fr. Leonid Kishkovsky is the OCA member of the Board of Directors, and chair of IOCC's Church Relations Committee.

Orthodox Christian Mission Center

Mission and Evangelism agency endorsed by the Assembly of Bishops (previously by the SCOBA). OCMC has sent mission teams around the world and has supported mission and evangelism work by the local Orthodox churches. OCMC headquarters is located in St. Augustine, Florida. Orthodox Church America members of the Board of Directors are Frs. Matthew Tate, John Parker, Ted Pisarchuk, and Mrs. Elizabeth Slanta.

North American Orthodox - Catholic Theological Consultation

This fruitful theological consultation continues to meet two times a year, building on the record of dialogue and consultation over several decades – in 2015 the consultation will celebrate its $50^{\rm th}$ year, making it the longest uninterrupted ecumenical dialogue. Representing the OCA are Bishop Alexander of Toledo, Fr. John Erickson, and Dr. Paul Meyendorff.

St. Irenaeus Orthodox-Catholic Working Group

This is an informal international dialogue - now beginning its second decade. Dr. Paul Meyendorff participates by invitation.

Consultation with the Anglican Church of North America

This dialogue is exploratory – with the blessing of the Holy Synod of he OCA the goal is to identify areas of theological agreement and disagreement on the road to understanding one another better. There is no predicting where this consultation will lead. The OCA participants are Archbishop Melchisedek, Frs. Leonid Kishkovsky, Chad Hatfield, John Pierce, and John Parker.

Lausanne Orthodox Initiative

The Lausanne Movement, a network of evangelicals, has committed to dialogue with the Orthodox Churches. Participation in a series of consultations is by invitation. In 2013 the first consultation was held in Albania, hosted by His Beatitude Archbishop Anastasios at St. Vlash Monastery. Fr. Leonid Kishkovsky attended to present a paper. In 2014 the second consultation was held – once again in Albania. Fr. Eric Tosi presented a paper. In 2015 the third consultation will be held in Helsinki. Both Frs. Leonid Kishkovsky and Eric Tosi have been invited.

Working Group on Orthodox Theological Education

An international and inter-Orthodox working to bring coherence to theological education curricula in light of Europe-wide standards. This is particularly important for theological schools in former communist societies, where state accreditation for theological schools has not been secured. The St. Vladimir's experience in strategic planning and curriculum development has drawn particular interest. Dr. Paul Meyendorff represents both the OCA and SVS in this process.

March for Life

OCA bishops, led by the primate, together with OCA clergy and laity, have been instrumental in bringing the Orthodox Christian voice and presence to the annual March for Life in Washington, DC. In the course of many years the Primate of the OCA has given the Orthodox prayer at the big public event. In 2014 and 2015 the Assembly of Canonical Bishops has become the Orthodox profile at the public event of the March for Life, with Greek Orthodox hierarchs speaking on behalf of the Assembly. The OCA participation is nevertheless key to the Orthodox involvement in the March for Life. Over the years Fr. John Kowalczyk has been the standard-bearer in ensuring Orthodox inclusion in the organization of the March for Life.

Ecumenical

World Council of Churches

Global ecumenical organization in which all Orthodox Churches (with the exception of Georgia and Bulgaria) participate as members. Bishop Alexander of Toledo is the OCA member of the Central Committee. Dr. Paul Meyendorff is member of Faith and Order.

National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA (NCC)

National ecumenical organization in which the key Eastern Orthodox member churches are the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese and the Orthodox Church in America. The Oriental Orthodox Churches participating in the NCC are the Armenian Church, the Syriac Orthodox Church of Antioch, and the Coptic Orthodox Church. Fr. Leonid Kishkovsky serves on the governing bodies (Executive Committee and Governing Board), having served as the first Orthodox President of the NCC in the early 1990s. PDN Serge Kapral from time to time is OCA representative at NCC meetings.

Christian Churches Together in the USA (CCT)

National Christian forum organized along the lines of "families" – 1) Eastern and Oriental Orthodox; 2) Catholic; 3) African American; 4) Historic Protestant; 5) Pentecostal and Evangelical. All the major Christian streams in the US are represented, making this the most inclusive Christian forum in the US. Fr. Leonid Kishkovsky served as Orthodox President (each of the five families elects a President) and as Moderator of the Steering Committee for several years. After rotating off the Steering Committee as the rules require, Fr. Kishkovsky has been asked to return to the Steering Committee. PDN Serge Kapral from time to time represents the OCA.

Interfaith

Religions for Peace (formerly called World Conference of Religions for Peace)

Global interfaith organization and network for promoting peace and peace-making. Played a constructive role in several conflict regions in the Balkans, Africa, Asia, and the Middle East. Fr. Kishkovsky was elected Vice Moderator at the 1999 Assembly in Amman, and Moderator at the 2006 Assembly in Kyoto. After concluding his term as Moderator in 2013, he was elected Honorary President.

Religions for Peace USA

The Religions for Peace network in the USA, offering a forum for interfaith conversations and dialogues in American society. Fr. Kishkovsky served a Moderator of Religions for Peace for some ten years, and currently is a member of the large group of Presidents.

Appeal of Conscience

An interfaith foundation created and led by Rabbi Arthur Schneier of New York. The organization played a useful role in relations with religious communities in communist societies, and in their relations with their respective governments. During the war in Bosnia visits by the Appeal to Belgrade, Zagreb, Sarajevo, and Pristina attempted to bring political and religious leaders to the table to bring violence to an end. The Appeal succeeded in bringing the US State Department to the realization that religion and religious communities should not be ignored in international relations. As a Trustee of the Appeal of conscience, Fr. Kishkovsky has travelled with delegations to the Soviet Union and Russia, Croatia, Serbia, Bosnia, Kosovo, Turkey, Austria, and Switzerland.

Foreign Policy Studies

Council on Foreign Relations (CFR)

Non-partisan body for foreign policy studies, with offices in NYC and Washington, DC. On a regular basis members are invited to meet with political leaders (presidents, prime ministers, foreign ministers), civil society and human rights activists, scholars with expertise in issues involved in crises and conflicts around the world, US diplomats, legislators, and economists. CFR organizes an annual workshop on Religion and Foreign Policy. Fr. Kishkovsky was nominated by Religions for Peace for election to the CFR and continues as a member.

Current state of relations with Orthodox Churches

In December 2014 His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon met with three Orthodox Patriarchs. 1) The meeting with Patriarch Kirill of Moscow took place in the context of His Beatitude's official protocol visit at the head of a delegation to the Russian Orthodox Church. The official meeting with Patriarch Kirill included a formal greeting in the Patriarchal residence in Danilovsky Monastery, exchange of views, lunch with further discussion, and finally concelebration of the Divine Liturgy for the Feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple in the Uspensky (Dormition) Cathedral in the Kremlin. All indications are that the period of tension and difficulty in relations connected with the retirement of Metropolitan

Jonah has been overcome. His Beatitude is seen in the Moscow Patriarchate as a serious, spiritual, and responsible church leader. 2) The meeting with Patriarch John of Antioch took place at the Patriarchal Liturgy in Washington, DC. The encounter opened the door to a visit by His Beatitude to Lebanon at a future date. 3) The meeting with the Ecumenical Patriarch took place in the context of a St. Vladimir's Seminary visit to Halki. His Beatitude traveled to Halki as President of SVS. This opened the door to further conversations between the OCA and Constantinople, overcoming the rejection of such dialogue since 2009.

Relations with Orthodox Churches in the near future

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon has accepted an invitation from the Supreme Catholicos of All Armenians, Karekin II, to attend an observance of the 100^{th} anniversary of the Armenian Genocide. This event will include the canonization of Armenian martyrs. Among the guests attending will be presidents, prime ministers, foreign ministers and ambassadors, Eastern Orthodox and Oriental Orthodox primates and delegations. After the events in Armenia His Beatitude plans to make his official visit to neighboring Georgia. The details of the Georgia visit are being worked out with the Georgian Orthodox Church.

During the next months His Beatitude intends to host US Orthodox leaders for lunch at the Chancery.

The premises is also described in Deed of St. Tickhon's Russian Monastery Cemetery Association to St. Tikhon Russian Orthodox Orphanage, which Deed was executed on July 18, 1940 and is recorded in the Wayne County Recorder of Deeds Office to Deed Book 147, Page 461 on September 26, 1940. It consists, in total, of 7.374 acres, more or less;

Be it further resolved that in accordance with the The Statute of The Orthodox Church in America, including, but not necessarily limited to, Article V, Section 4g, we hereby approve now and forever after the transfer of said lands as follows:



- 5,441 acres of land more or less, identified as "REMAINING LAND OF ORPHANAGE PARCEL D.B. 147, F. 461" on a minor subdivision map of lands of St. Tikhon Orthodox Orphanage dated April 5, 2013 and recorded to Wayne County Map Book 118, Page 117, PIN# 24-0-0271-0040.0003, to be transferred for the sum of ONE (\$1.00) DOLLAR to ST. TIKHONS GREEK RUSSIAN ORTHODOX CHURCH, a Pennsylvania Non-profit Corporation, D/B/A ST. TIKHON'S MONASTERY, of 175 St. Tikhon's Road, Wayman, County of Wayne and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, 18472,

The subdivision of the Orphanage property into these two parcels is further approved;

Furthermore, the OCA approves the lease to St. Tikhon's Orthodox Theological Seminary of the former Orphanage Building located on the parcel that is to be transferred to St. Tikhon's Monastery for \$1.00 for a term of 99 years from a beginning date to be established by the parties thereto;

We further approve and authorize the responsible authority(ies) for each of the aforementioned entities to execute any and all documents and take any and all actions now and after today's date for all time, to accomplish the same.




Fellowship
